

## Dear SDSEO Member:

Week 1 of the 2024 Legislative Session is in the books. There were no bad surprises or negative bills this week. The tenor of the session is also good so far, with good questions and capable presentations. And even though I'm in my 13<sup>th</sup> session, I've even learned some new things from a couple hearings; that's courtesy of the legislators themselves seeking to expand their knowledge, and that's been a pleasant and surprising development. Sometimes one has to scratch their head at questions one would think a legislator would know after 5-6 years, but you know, not everyone pays attention.

The state employee compensation and health budget hearing will be the very last budget hearing on the very last day of Joint Appropriations budget hearings, like normal: Feb. 7 from 10:45 a.m. to noon. Here is the broad brushstroke of the Governor's plan for state employees:

https://bfm.sd.gov/budget/FY2025/EmployeeCompensation.pdf. The 4% market adjustment is there, as is the extra state kick in on your health insurance. I have asked but do not yet know why there's a decrease in federal funds for health insurance; we'll find out on Feb. 7. There are General and Other Funds to pick up the slack there, and hopefully you won't see added costs in the proposal on Feb. 7.

I've pitched a fit in the past about your comp and benefits being the very last budget item every year, as there have been so much scraps for the bulk of you in the recent past, but this Legislature, now in its second year, proved me wrong last year by really stepping up and helping you out with a big compensation package. I think how they are approaching their budget hearings is good, with good questions and information asks. I've also had really decent working relationships with legislators from all sorts of factions this last interim and so far this session. I think things are looking good, but we must be vigilant.

Explore the page and the links and make to share with your colleagues, ALL of whom we need as members, not kidding. The recruiting needs to ramp way up. \$10 month to support this organization, the only of its kind in the state, is pretty darn inexpensive. (Yes, it's too much for some; we lost a longtime member this summer who couldn't afford it.) Dues haven't been raised for 13-14 years, and they're not going to get raised. We need participation. We need members. Keep the faith and keep up the fight.

All of the SDSEO's funding comes from membership; outfits like this receive zero state or federal dollars or incentives or tax breaks. While so much of the non-profit universe is focused on 501c(3) charities that were created to seek donations and then give the funds away to hard-pressed folks either in the form of cash or in the form of services, professional and labor non-profits such as the SDSEO are important too. Non-profit organizations like the SDSEO exist to help create and maintain healthy careers and service,

hopefully keeping charities in the business of providing aid to the hardest pressed. That's why charities have tax-free donation and deduction status and organizations like the SDSEO do not.

Make sure to spread the word about the SDSEO and encourage membership. You're likely going to go out with co-workers on lunch or after work: Maybe offer to pay for their lunch that one time (you're probably going to anyway at some point, since you're a South Dakotan) and encourage them to join the SDSEO, which likely costs less than 1 work lunch a month.
